

Templin Scroll Competition

Judging Criteria

1. Overview

The Templin Scroll Competition involves two awards. The Templin Scroll shall be awarded for the best written and presented report. The Templin Prize shall be awarded for the best written report (with preference given to technical papers).

The Templin Scroll may be awarded to one candidate only or up to three as a first, second and third place. This is at the discretion of the judges and Engineering Society; it shall be decided according to the prize pool and quality of submissions.

The Templin Prize is awarded to one candidate who did not receive the Templin Scroll award. It is to be of lesser value than the Templin Scroll awards.

Refer to the *Templin Scroll Regulations* for more details regarding subject the matter and form of the reports and presentations. Candidates must be eligible in accordance with these regulations.

2. Assessment

The assessment for the Templin Scroll comprises two components, an oral presentation mark and a written report mark. The Templin Prize award shall only consider the written component. The judging criteria are given on the following page.

3. Deadlines

Reports must be submitted by 5pm on Friday of the second week in term four. One hard copy is to be submitted at the College of Engineering Office and a digital copy is to be emailed to faculty@ensoc.com.

The finalists will be notified via email by Monday of the fourth week in term four. They will then have at least a week to prepare a presentation of their report.
