

CONDITIONS OF ENTRY AND AWARD OF THE TEMPLIN SCROLL COMPETITION

NAME:

The competition shall be known as the TEMPLIN SCROLL COMPETITION. It shall be held annually and all papers shall be presented during the fourth term of the academic year.

ELIGIBILITY:

The competition shall be open to any student taking a regular course of study at the School of Engineering who is a financial member of the Engineering Society.

SUBJECT MATTER AND FORM OF THE PAPERS:

The subject matter may embrace any aspect of engineering or applied science, technical, economic or human. The paper shall be written in a form suitable for publication or for submission as a project or design report, but postgraduate students may not present a paper directly relating to their field of research. It shall be the author's own work (a bibliography should be appended) and presented by the student.

ENTRIES:

Completed papers or reports will be received until the last day of the first week of the fourth term. Late entries will not be received except by express permission of the Executive of the Engineering Society. Papers or reports shall be typed on one side of A4 size paper.

Not more than nine (9) papers for this Competition may be read before the Society in any one year. In the event of there being more than nine entries, one copy of each paper shall be submitted to the judges who shall select the nine best papers for presentation.

PRESENTATION OF PAPERS AND PRIZES:

A period of 20 minutes (15 minutes presentation and 5 minutes questions) will be allowed for the presentation of each paper during periods to be held in the first two weeks of the fourth term. The times of these periods shall be made known publicly and be open to all members of the Engineering School and the Profession.

RESPONSIBILITY:

The Scroll shall be hung in the Library of the Engineering School and shall be the joint responsibility of the Engineering Society and the Dean.

JUDGES:

There shall be three judges nominated by the Dean of the School of Engineering. One judge shall be a member of the University staff and one a practising engineer.

The judges shall present a report on the Competition as a whole and also some comment on all speakers and papers at the joint meeting with the Canterbury Branch of the Institution of Professional Engineers of New Zealand, where they shall announce the winners of both the Templin Scroll and the Templin Prize. The judge's decision shall be final. The judges may discuss the papers and their presentation with the entrants after the report has been presented.

JUDGING:

The Templin Scroll shall be awarded for the best written and presented paper. The Templin Prize shall be awarded for the best written paper (with preference given to technical papers). The winner of the Templin Scroll shall not be eligible for the award of the Templin Prize.

NOTE ON THE AWARDS:

The Templin Scroll Award was donated to the Society in 1941. This was followed by the further donation of the Templin Prize in 1945.

The donor, J R Templin, was a prominent consultant electrical engineer. He was the first Chairman of the Canterbury Branch of the New Zealand Institution of Engineers. Throughout his career he took a keen interest in the Engineering Society. His awards were made with the express intention of encouraging engineers in the art of presenting their subject to others.
